
Central NY's Housing Market



ARMORY SQUARE

Armory Square, a historic district in downtown Syracuse, is a vibrant hub for dining, shopping, and entertainment. Housed in a 19th-century warehouse district, it showcases an urban renaissance with boutiques, art galleries, bakeries, a brewery, and more.

Once a bustling area with over 20 hotels serving the railroads, it declined as rail travel waned in the 1930s. The Jefferson Street Armory, built around this time, is actually three buildings and was once used to quarter the cavalry and the infantry. Many buildings were abandoned or demolished by the mid-20th century.

However, its rich architectural heritage was recognized in 1984 when it was designated a National Historic District, sparking revitalization and growth. Today it's a very popular area for night life.

DOWNTOWN EAST

Downtown East surrounds Fayette Firefighters' Memorial Park, a scenic green space with mature trees, benches, a fountain, and firefighter monuments, making it a popular spot for relaxation. Once a swamp, the area evolved into a prestigious residential district. The Hamilton White House, built in 1832 by banker and investor Hamilton White, reflects this era of prosperity.



HEART OF DOWNTOWN

South Salina and South Warren Streets are downtown Syracuse's historic main streets, lined with shops, eateries, and retailers. The area includes The Galleries of Syracuse, home to the central library, and several buildings on the National Register of



Historic Places. Ongoing revitalization efforts, supported by state funding, aim to transform the district into a vibrant hub with retail, dining, and loft apartments, driving significant private investment.

HANOVER SQUARE

Hanover Square, Syracuse's first commercial district, is now a vibrant mix of offices, retail, and residences. Centered around a plaza with a fountain, it hosts summer entertainment and offers a European-style lifestyle with cafes, salons, and nightlife.

Listed on the National Register of Historic Places, the Square showcases diverse 19thcentury architecture, some dating to 1834.

Once a key commerce hub along the Erie Canal, it later served as a Civil War recruitment site and witnessed Syracuse's first hot air balloon launch in 1871. Many historic buildings now feature loft-style apartments, blending history with modern living.

PRESIDENTIAL PLAZA

Presidential Plaza, on downtown's east side, features apartments and townhouses. Its close proximity to University Hill hospitals makes it a popular choice for medical students, doctors and hospital staff.



CLINTON SQUARE

Clinton Square has long been a hub of activity in Syracuse, once serving as a key loading point along the Erie Canal. Today, it remains a downtown centerpiece with a fountain, outdoor seating, and year-round events. From June to October, it hosts the Downtown Farmers' Market and festivals like Taste of Syracuse and the Northeast Jazz & Wine Fest. In winter, the fountain becomes an ice-skating rink, keeping the square lively in all seasons.



CATHEDRAL SQUARE

Cathedral Square is a vibrant Syracuse neighborhood, home to key civic, cultural, and governmental institutions. It seamlessly blends living, learning, the arts, and public service with elegance and charm.

TIPPERARY HILL

In the 1820s, when the Erie Canal first was built from Albany, New York to Buffalo, New York, the Irish were the chief laborers. Syracuse is about the middle of the route, the "hub" of the system. When the canal was finished many of the Irish settled west of Syracuse on a hill overlooking the canal. This area became known as <u>Tipperary Hill</u> and a tanker of green beer arrives in March to kick off St. Patrick's Day.

The Green on Top Traffic Light

Tipperary Hill is home to <u>the only upside-down</u> <u>traffic light</u> in the United States.



When the city first started to install traffic signal lights in the 1920s they put one at a major intersection on Tipperary Hill, on the corner of Tompkins Street and Milton Avenue.

Some Irish youths, incensed that anyone would dare to put the "<u>British</u>" red above the "<u>Irish</u>" green, broke the light. The city replaced it but the Irish broke the replacement. After a few rounds of this the city decided that if they wanted a light at that intersection, they had better put the signal up inverted, and they did.

CONVENTION DISTRICT

The Convention District, on downtown's southern edge, is home to the Everson Museum of Art, known for its ceramics, video art, and I.M. Pei design. It also features the Oncenter Convention Center, a versatile venue for conventions, sports, concerts, and events, with an attached 1,000-car garage.

East Syracuse-Minoa Schools

East Syracuse - An older neighborhood East of the City.

Erie Village and Fremont Hills (East Syracuse) Adjacent to or near The Links at Erie Village Golf Club: \$200,000 - \$500,000

Fayetteville-Manlius Schools

Briarbrook (Fayetteville) 5 minutes to Green Lakes State Park. Large upscale neighborhood, includes small section of patio homes: \$400,000-\$995,000

Changing Seasons (Fayetteville) 2 minutes to Green Lakes State Park. Contemporary homes in a wooded setting: \$350,000 -\$550,000

Mallard's Landing (Manlius) 10 minutes to Cazenovia Lake. Very large neighborhood with a wide variety of styles includes condos, patio homes and medium to very large and estate style homes: \$400,000 - \$1,700,000
